Working with children and parents involved in high conflict custody and access disputes can be challenging to child welfare, counsellors, and legal professionals, especially when domestic violence, child maltreatment or alienation is alleged. This workshop will explore the factors associated with high conflict families and address the complexity of working with this volatile population. Since children's exposure to domestic violence is the most substantiated type of child maltreatment in custody cases, professionals need to be vigilant in keeping families safe while working with repeated allegations, hostile interactions among parents and strained parent-child relationships.

The workshop will focus on early detection of high conflict families and how to best intervene for the sake of the children. Within this complex framework for understanding and responding to the needs of high conflict families, the benefits and challenges of distinguishing domestic violence, high conflict, child maltreatment and alienation cases will be explored in order to provide families with the most effective services.
